# SERMON: "Christ Will Shine on You" by The Reverend Dr. Janet Hufford

As we know from sermons prior to week, Ephesians is about what it means to be in God's family. Let's review what we have heard thus far. The 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> chapters of Ephesians revealed how the Father adopts us into his family thru Christ the Son. Next we're exhorted to unity in the family of God. In the context of unity, Mike Bernstein, a Messianic Jewish believer who is a member of FPCP, preached about how Jewish and Gentile believers in Yeshua or Jesus are to be fully reconciled. Yesterday I received an email from Grant Barry, writer of Romans 911 from which Mike referred in his sermon. The email was an encouragement for believers to pray for Jewish persons to come to know Jesus as the Messiah too. For from midnight to noon time today, people are gathering in Israel in context with a Purim, after party in effect, to pray for

the Messiah to come. Purim is also a time to give to those in poverty. Similarly earlier this week I sent to the FPC mission committee an invitation that I received from Israel to help impoverished Jews there to have food for the upcoming Passover, which corresponds to holy week from Palm Sunday through Easter. Just a couple of weeks prior, I had a similar discussion with Mike Bernstein about providing food for Jewish feasts to Jews living in poverty. Ephesians exhorts us to unity with our Jewish brothers and sisters. Also in the context of unity, we heard instructions in Ephesians for members of Christian households: husbands & wives, servants, and children. At this point we learned how unity comes as we become adult children of God, maturing in the faith under the instruction of Christ's teaching through the Holy Spirit. The verses about maturity come immediately before today's passage. For the sake of understanding today's Scripture, listen again to Ephesians 4:14-16. Having been aimed in the right direction both toward unity and maturity, we can hear today's passage, aptly entitled "instructions for Christian living."

Let's begin by considering the passing of the days, through the sun, moon and stars, as the Creator God set in motion at the beginning of time.

On 11/1 we set our clocks to fall back, so darkness came earlier in the evening. The length of darkness increases till the winter solstice, the longest night of the year, when winter starts on 12/21. This is the date that we held our Blue Christmas service, where we enacted John 8:12 through candlelight. Beforehand, Advent was focused on John 1:15, where we lit Advent candles, which is part of our tradition. Another tradition is singing "Silent Night" by candlelight, which we did on Christmas Eve. This year we held up our candles in the dark at our windows or outside for neighbors to see.

On the liturgical calendar last week was the celebration of the anniversary of Jesus' Transfiguration. The Gospels reveal this as the time when Jesus was transfigured on the mountain showing forth the glory of the Father in his

pre-resurrected body before the eyes of 3 of his disciples: Peter, James and John.

Now consider Ephesians 4:17-5:7 the start of today's passage in light of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ. Here Paul admonishes the Ephesians, who live in the pagan land of what is modern day Turkey, to no longer live as Gentiles. To not grieve the Holy Spirit by living in the darkness, but to put off old ways and to instead put on a new self. I remember getting a new outfit at important times of the year: Easter, first day of school, and Christmas, for example. Putting on and living into our faith in Christ is like changing into fresh new clothes. I wrote the sermon just after we set back our clocks with long nights approaching, so got a new shade to better see the light. The day I wrote this sermon I put a new lampshade onto the floor lamp in my living room. The old one was dark, dingy and old. I see more light with my new lamp shade. Next comes Ephesians 5:8-13. Here Paul explains that we do not simply put on light. We are light and should live as children of light. On transfiguration Jesus reflects the glorious light of the Father as his Son. Since then Jesus died, was buried, and rose, at which point Jesus' resurrection body is fully glorified, like the Father. No longer hidden in the darkness of the world, but, shining with light, Jesus is the light.

As his followers, we reflect the light of Jesus, before we obtain our resurrection bodies, just as Jesus reflected the glorious light of the Father.

So Jesus at the sermon of the mount from Matthew said that we are the light of the world. Paul alludes to Jesus' words from that parable.

As light then, Jesus makes visible and exposes that which is hidden in darkness. As his followers, we are called to do the same. We are not to keep shameful secrets hidden, but to bring them into the light. We just hear this teaching in joint officer training from the book "The Transforming Community."

Next Paul reminds readers of what is said in Ephesians 5:14: "Wake up, sleeper, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you." The bright light of morning streams through a window, when darkness is over. If the sun rises before the need to awake, it is difficult to stay asleep with bright sunlight streaming into the room, unless one applies room darkening curtains or a sleep mask!

Finally we read Ephesians 5:15-18. Paul summarizes the passage with: Be very careful, then, how you live.

Therefore, consider how Ephesians 4:17-5:18 reiterates a number of the 10 commandments that deal with how we are treat one another.

Commandment 6: Do not murder. In the sermon on the mount, Jesus explains that we should not speak angry words to a brother. Ephesians cautions us to not sin in anger, but to forgive thru Christ. And to stop unwholesome talk. What is our talk like? Is it unwholesome? Further, do we avoid listening to unwholesome talk?

Commandment 7: Do not commit adultery. The Greek word for adultery has a wider span that we may think. The word encompasses all sexual immorality. In the sermon on the mount, Jesus warns against lusting. The Greek word is porneo. The council of Jerusalem in Acts 15 did not reiterate all the commandments, but were summarized in two expectations, which went against common Gentile practices. First, Gentiles were no longer to participate in worship of idols, but to worship only the one true God. Second, Gentiles were not to participate in sexual immorality. Both Jesus and Paul expect the same. What about us? Do we practice sexual immorality and lusting? Further do we avoid temptations to sexual immorality? Commandment 8: Do not steal. Ephesians says the same.

Commandment 10 is related: Do not covet. Paul in Ephesians expects believers to desist in greed. What about us? Do we yearn for what we do not have?

Commandment 9: Do not lie. Do not bear false witness. What about us? Do we lie to cover up our sins? Are little white lies considered harmless? Further, do we ever lie by omission?

To summarize, let us not live in darkness. Jesus is the light. Thru him, we are the light. Let us live as people of the light. Let us be light in this darkened world. Amen.
